Maclean's editor plans to engage audience

The opening session of the ARUCC 2002 conference features Maclean's education expert Ann Dowsett Johnston. She will address delegates in a keynote speech this morning (9 a.m. in Salon A, main floor).

Her presentation "The Importance of Engagement" will emphasize how post-secondary institutions can jump start a public dialogue about higher education, which Dowsett Johnston says is "in a crisis."

"Health care and education have gone head to head in the fight for public dollars and health care has won out."

She will also cover how universities and colleges can engage young Canadians to enroll in post-secondary institutions and how to entice more participation from current students.

Dowsett Johnston is known for her outspoken approach and has been critical of government cuts to post-secondary education. She has continually called on provincial governments to reinvest. Dowsett Johnston has been with Maclean's since 1977 and has spent the last two decades tackling the education front.

Currently serving as Editor at Large, she has headed the magazine's best-selling national university ranking's issue since 1992, a project that has earned her five gold National Magazine Awards. She has also served as editor of the Macleans's Guide to Canadian Universities and the Macleans's Guide to Canadian Colleges for the last seven years.

She is a regular education columnist and has accepted the inaugural award for educational journalism, given by the Collegium of Work and Learning.

Following her address, there will be a panel discussion on the keynote themes.

The panel will be moderated by ARUCC president Lea Pennock (University of Saskatchewan), and include Louis Ariano (York University), Deanne Dennison (Dalhousie University), Robin Geller (McGill



University), David Johnston (University of Calgary), Deborah Robinson (University of British Columbia) and Brian Silzer (University of British Columbia).

Animated and insightful, Dowsett Johnston is sure to spur some lively thought and debate for the panel.
